#### Family Detained After Daughter Speaks Out

WASHING-TON — Days after a 24-year-old college graduate spoke out on her immigration plight in USA Today, U.S. agents arrested her family including her father, a Vietnamese man who once was confined to a "re-

education" camp in his home country for anti-communist activities.

Rep. Zoe Lofgren, D-Calif., who chairs the House immigration subcommittee, accused federal officials of "witness intimidation" for staging a pre-dawn raid on the home of TuanNgoc Tran.

The agents arrested Tran, his wife and son, charging them with being fugitives from justice, even though the family's attorneys said the Trans have been reporting to immigration officials annually to obtain work permits.

Lofgren said she believes the family was targeted because Tran's eldest child, Tam Tran, testified before Lofgren's panel earlier this spring in support of legislation that would help the children of illegal immigrants.

### Chinese Group Says Candidate Was Insulting

MONTVILLE, Conn. — Mayoral candidate James Andriote Sr. offended some Chinese residents in a recent debate, when he singled out the Asian community while discussing housing issues.

Andriote said that with the expansion of Mohegan Sun, there would be more hotbeds (more than 10 people living in a house, sometimes in violation of health and fire codes) in town. He referred to "the Asians" and said the area where they live and walk to work at the casino, on Route 32, is "a bad situation" and "very dangerous."

During the debate, Andriote also brought up the Chinese population when talking about a pending affordable-housing complex. "I'm not in favor of it," he said. "It will probably be bought out by the Asians.

Andriote recommended another location for an affordable-housing complex, because "it's too far for the Asians to walk to."

Jan Ting made opposition to illegal immigration a key issue of his Senate bid, and has been chosen to serve on an immigration advisory board for the Giuliani campaign.

Ting is a Temple University professor and was assistant commissioner at the former Immigration and Naturalization Service under President George H.W. Bush.

State Republican Chairman Terry Strine says adding Ting as an advisor shows Giuliani is serious about protecting the border.





## Lost the Crown But Gained Her Dream

anine Lee is your typical girl in the San Francisco Bay Area: a 23-year-old recent college grad, budding socialite in the

nightlife scene, and sometime actress, martial artist and community activist.

She also happens to be CEO of Capture the Dream, a nonprofit aimed to help underserved and at-risk Bay Area residents succeed at school and find fulfilling, sustaining careers. The group delivers financial aid to low-income families, single-parent homes, foster children and children recovering from traumas. It also supports youth development and leadership advancement through mentoring, education, arts and cultural programs. This year, the organization took home the Maybelline New York Empowerment Through Education Award and a \$10,000 donation from Maybelline New York and People magazine.

But a year and a half ago, the U.C. Davis alumna was almost too discouraged to live out her dream after she failed to win the 2005 Miss Asian America title.

Janine's mentor Rauhmel Fox, CEO of WHOmentors.com, Inc., counseled her to keep things in perspective. "I told her, 'Here's the problem: if you win, you reign for one year. But what happens after a year?" Fox said. "I said to her, How about doing this for a lifetime instead?"

Janine took her mentor's advice to heart, and in July 2006, Capture the Dream was born from

courage to help the community," marveled Rose Chung, Miss Chinatown 1981 and president of the Miss Asian America Pageant. "I always noticed that she was a doer.'

Though Janine admits that she has recurring dreams of entering the beauty pageant for a second time, she said she is satisfied with being a nationally recognized CEO and a member of the 0.16 percent of Asian American women executives in American business today.

And her optimism is contagious. "Always chase your dreams; after all, they are not going to chase you" is part of her life philosophy and the inspiration for her company logo: the Native American Ojibway dream catcher, which is traditionally hung from the bed of a child to catch bad dreams and filter bad spirits.

Capture the Dream is also appreciated by seasoned social work-

her pageant platform. Today, the group's work includes the Dreampack program, which provides a backpack brimming with school supplies for underprivileged students, and a scholarship fund for budding minority leaders in memoriam to her grandfather, George Geng On Lee.

"I was always interested in volunteering," she remembers, "but it wasn't rewarding to feel like just one of a hundred faces, feeling forgettable." She recalled an incident in high school when people failed to recognize her during a signature drive, despite having volunteered at various libraries, schools and hospitals since the age of 13.

Today, Janine realizes that minor setbacks are never personal, and she aims to make herself unique by setting an example. After the library at Oakland's Peralta Elementary School suffered massive smoke damage due to a fire in March, Capture the Dream organized a book drive that received great applause from the Oakland Tribune. She even corralled her family to lend a hand: her father shuttled books between local bookstores and the school.

"I'm very proud of Janine. She represents contestants who are ambitious, original and have the ers such as Vandnez Lam of San Francisco's Legal Services for Children. "[We] are working at the front lines," she explained. "The pay sucks and it's emotionally draining, but every hour people can donate makes a difference, especially in San Francisco where the living standard is so high."

Janine played hostess and master of ceremonies on Nov. 6 at The Atrium in San Francisco and also enjoyed a lavish and celebrity-studded award ceremony in New York City on Nov. 1, attended by Maybelline New York spokeswomen Danna Garcia, Tomiko Fraser, Erin Wasson and Hollywood fashion guru Phillip Bloch.

In her spare time — when she can find it — Janine just looks forward to Tuesday night dinners with her grandmother and a casual jog. She's just a normal gal, with big dreams.

#### A Partnership for a **Safe Community**

#### Emergency Calls

On the average day, the Union City Police Department receives approximately fifty 9-1-1 emergency calls in its dispatch center. What do you expect when you dial 9-1-1 in the City of Union City? How can you be best prepared if you need to dial 9-1-1? Emergencies happen when we least expect them and they require fast thinking and action, but different emergencies call for different approaches. Here are some things to

know so you will be prepared.

When should I dial 9-1-1? Call 9-1-1 when someone needs immediate help because they are injured

#### or in immediate danger, or if there is a crime in progress. Who will I be talking with?

The person answering the phone is a professionally trained call taker who will record all of your information and create a call for service in the police dispatch computer. The most important thing to remember when you call 9-1-1 is to remain calm and allow the call taker to direct the questions. It is important that the call taker has complete and accurate information so that your call can be han-

dled as efficiently and safely as possible. What happens when I dial 9-1-1?

The call taker will be asking very specific questions pertaining to citizen and officer safety. Situations can change very quickly thereby making it necessary for the call taker to continue to ask questions while the officers are responding in order to provide updates to responding officers. The call is then prioritized by the police radio disparcher based on the exigency of the situation. The police dispatcher monitors all radio traffic and dispatches officers to the calls that have been entered by the call takers.

If you have a fire or medical emergency you will be transferred to the Alameda County Fire Dispatch Center in Livermore, who acts as the dispatch center for Union City's fire department. Their staff is trained in emergency medical dispatch. If you are reporting an emergency that is occurring outside of Union City, you will be transferred to the appropriate agency.

When you dial 9-1-1 from your home or business, the phone number, address, and subscriber information from that line will appear on our dispatch screen, however we always verify this information for accuracy. If you are dialing 9-1-1 from a cell phone, your cell phone number, and the nearest cell tower's address will display. Because this information is often vague, you will need to give the location of the emergency to the call taker so that we have the accurate information to form an appro-

#### priate response and locate your emergency. What if I don't speak English?

When those who speak a language other than English call 9-1-1, translators are brought on the line to assist with the call. There is a delay while language specific translators are located, so non-English speakers should stay on the line while the call taker locates an interpreter. Non-English speakers should say the name of the language that they are speaking in English in order to expedite the

#### How is your 9-1-1 call dispatched?

After receiving a call for service the idio dispatcher will then prioritize all calls for service. Calls are prioritized based on danger to life over danger to property, and based on the time that has passed since the incident occurred. In progress incidents have the highest priority, followed by just occurred incidents, and finally "cold" reports, in which some time

has passed since the incident. Remember it is always better to call 9-1-1 than to risk not getting help when you need it. If you call 9-1-1 with a situation that is not deemed to be an emergency, the call taker will assist you by referring you to a non-emergency line.

Fox mentioned his Nonprofit Incubator Program and suggested that Chu take advantage of her new title to establish an organization. She admitted that while her new mentor has taken care of the paperwork and guided her through much of the preliminary work, most of the responsibilities, such as pub-

licizing and fundraising, lies ahead. Having created "Everything Possible" just two months ago, Chu has started actively looking for help in the community. In the past few weeks, she has asked restaurants and local stores for financial support and hopes to set up an open dance event in order to raise money to sponsor this year's AAU Junior Olympic games, an annual event that



aged children from substance abuse and other bad influences by educating them and encouraging involvement in sports and other meaningful, lifelong activities.
